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SYNOPSIS

On Tuesday, February 15th, 2011, between 2045 hours and 2108 hours, Tory R. "Rob" Manvilla entered two residences, 4765 Fairfax Avenue (EN 110215-3792) and 4786 Fairfax Avenue (EN 110215-3815), armed with a knife and claiming he was being chased, his life in danger. After entering 4786 Fairfax Avenue, Manvilla barricaded himself in the master bedroom's bathroom and refused to come out. Responding officers repeatedly called to Manvilla to come out of the bathroom, and when he did Manvilla charged the officers with the aforementioned knife in a raised, attack position. The officers discharged their weapons striking Manvilla in the chest. Manvilla was transported to Sunrise Hospital where he was pronounced dead by Doctor N. Blanco of the emergency room staff at 2145 hours.

INITIAL CALL(S) AND PELIMINARY INVESTIGATION

On Tuesday, February 15th, 2011, at 2047 hours, Jose Ramirez called the LVMPD Communications Center via 9-1-1 to report a subject, armed with a knife, was outside his residence at 4765 Fairfax Avenue, trying to get inside his residence, and claiming someone was after him; event number 110215-3792. Ramirez described the subject as a White male adult wearing a white shirt black pants, and tennis shoes, and the subject appeared to be talking to himself or someone Ramirez could not see. At 2056 hours Ramirez told the 9-1-1 operator the subject had left his residence, walking away on Fairfax Avenue, and possibly into another residence.

At 2056 hours, Winifred Ellis called the LVMPD Communications Center via 9-1-1 and reported a Hispanic male subject, dressed in a white shirt and black pants, and armed with a knife, had just forced his way into her residence at 4786 Fairfax Avenue claiming someone was after him; event number 110215-3815. Ellis further advised the subject was tearing up the residence and was believed to be in the master bathroom. (**Note:** As the calls appeared related, Communications referenced event number 3815 with event number 3792, and 3815 was closed.)

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The first officers to arrive at the Ellis residence at approximately 2058 hours, Officers Guzman and Auten, were told the suspect was in the master bedroom's bathroom. The officers instructed the Ellis' to vacate their residence and conducted a cursory sweep of the residence. The officers determined the suspect was still possibly hiding in the master bathroom. At 2059 hours, the officers broadcasted the suspect was in the bathroom and not responding to their commands to exit. Officer Auten requested additional officers to assist in securing the scene and cover a possible exit through the bathroom window.

At 2102 hours Officer Auten broadcast the subject was barricaded in the bathroom and not responding to the officers' repeated commands to come out. Ultimately Officers Guzman, Henry, Autin, Leavitt, and McKinney were positioned inside the residence, and Officer Crite covered the rear yard. At 2108 hours, the suspect exited the bathroom, charged the officers with the knife, and Officers Guzman and Henry each fired one shot striking the suspect. Officers broadcasted shots had been fired and requested medical personnel for the suspect; no officers were injured.

The unidentified suspect was transported to Sunrise Hospital by Medic West ambulance; escorted by Officer Murguia. Upon arrival at Sunrise Hospital, the suspect was pronounced dead by Doctor N. Blanco at 2145 hours.

Sergeant Webb, who had just entered the residence when the shots were fired, contacted Officers Guzman and Henry and completed the Public Safety Statement (P.S.S.) questionnaire. Officers Guzman, Henry, Autin, Leavitt, and McKinney were sequestered pending further investigation, the area secured with yellow crime scene tape, civilian victims / witnesses were identified and detained, Criminalistics requested, and Violent and Major Crimes detectives responded to the scene to initiate the investigation. At approximately 2126 hours, Lieutenant Roberts of the Homicide Section was contacted and made aware of the incident.

At approximately 2200 hours Lieutenant Roberts, along with Sergeant Fabian and Detectives Hanna, Mogg, Boucher, Kisner, Sanborn, and Ivie of the Homicide Section, Force Investigation Team (F.I.T.), were on scene and assumed the investigation. Detective Hanna, along with Crime Scene Investigators Reed, Roberts, and Smith, were assigned to document the scene, while Detective Kisner was assigned to follow up at Sunrise Hospital. Detectives Sanborn and Ivie were assigned to contact and interview civilian witnesses at the scene, while Detectives Mogg and Boucher followed up with the officers involved at the Investigative Services Division (I.S.D.) building.

CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATION**A. DESCRIPTION OF THE SCENE AND VISIBLE EVIDENCE**

The scene was confined to the master bedroom in the northwest portion of the 1200 square foot, single family, four bedroom residence located at 4786 Fairfax Avenue near the intersection of Fairfax Avenue and Cerriot Street in the southeast portion of the Las Vegas valley. The small bedroom was illuminated by a wall mounted light adjacent to the entry door along the southeast wall. The room was furnished with a bed – head against the northwest wall – table and night stand on either side, and a chest at the foot of the bed, a dresser along the north wall, and a chest

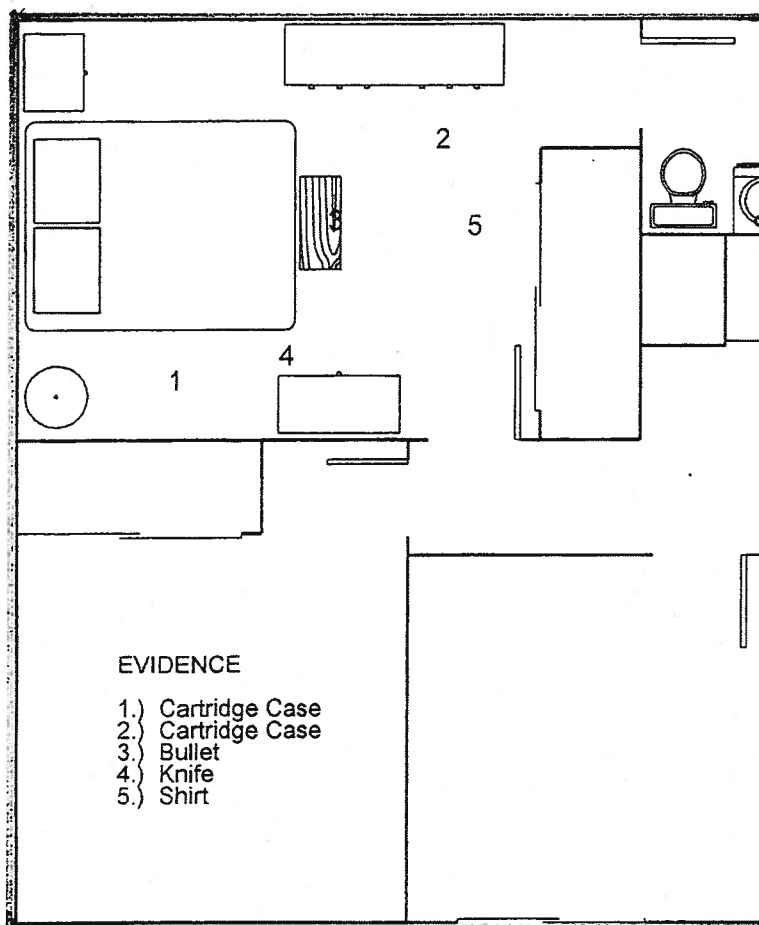
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of drawers along the south wall adjacent to the entry door. The master bathroom was located in the northeast corner of the bedroom, accessible via a short hallway. (See Scene Diagram.)

Located in the master bedroom, on the floor between the chest and closet, was a white, button down shirt with apparent blood (#5) – apparently cut away; on the floor adjacent to the shirt and towards the dresser was a spent 9mm Speer casing (#2); on the floor near the base of the chest of drawers was a steak knife with an approximately five inch smooth edge blade (#4); on the floor between the south side of the bed and the wall was a spent 9mm Speer casing (#1); and under the chest at the foot of the bed was one bullet (#3). (Note: Detectives learned casing #2 had been kicked / knocked from it's original position by medical personnel. Original position not established.)

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For additional details of the crime scene and the evidence recovered, see the reports prepared by CSIs Roberts and Smith under event number 110215-3792.

B. LOCATION AND DESCRIPTION OF BODY

The body was removed from the scene by medical personnel to Sunrise Hospital. Detective Kisner responded to Sunrise Hospital where he found the body of a White male adult lying supine on a Gurney in the trauma unit "quiet room." The body was wrapped in white sheets and had obvious evidence of medical intervention. There was no shirt on the body, clad only with black pants – lower left leg apparently cut by medical personnel – a belt, tennis shoes – one on and one off – and white socks.

Upon arrival of Coroner Investigator Dubasik, a cursory examination of the body revealed apparent gunshot wounds to the upper front torso. A small tuft of hair grasped between the fingers of the left hand was noted. CSI Thomas bagged both hands to preserve any potential evidence.

Contained in the pockets of the aforementioned pants was a Metro PCS cellular telephone – password locked and impounded by Detective Kisner; loose change, a phone charger, Carmex tube, a gaming card in the name of Tory Manvilla, and a black wallet containing miscellaneous paperwork, currency, and a Nevada identification card in the name of Tory Robin Manvilla, ID # 2103360964. (*Note: The photograph on the Nevada identification card appeared similar to the deceased.*) Also found in the wallet was a rent receipt for the Sun Flower Apartments, 1500 E. Fremont Street, #235, dated October 2010.

CSI Thomas photographed the body and the items recovered from the pants pockets, and the body was placed into a body bag, seal number 593397, and ultimately transported to the Clark County Coroner's office by Valley Mortuary.

(Note: While at Sunrise Hospital, Detective Kisner spoke with Medic West Ambulance Paramedic Mark Eshe, Jr., who said upon his arrival at the scene the CCFD paramedics had cut away Manvilla's shirt and applied EKG monitors. There was no sign of life, but an officer told them the subject had been breathing prior to their arrival and when this was reported to Sunrise Hospital Trauma Doctor J. Daugherty, they were directed to transport the body. Eshe's crew, along with an unidentified CCFD paramedic, transported Manvilla to Sunrise Hospital.)

AUTOPSY

On Wednesday, February 16th, 2011, at approximately 0900 hours, Doctor G. Telgenhoff, Clark County Medical Examiner's Office, conducted an autopsy on the body of Tory R. Manvilla.

F. RESULTS OF AUTOPSY

Pursuant to the autopsy and his examination of Manvilla's body, Doctor Telgenhoff determined the cause of death to be multiple gunshot wounds and the manner to be Homicide.

INVESTIGATION

INTERVIEW OF JOSE RAMIREZ: On February 15th, at approximately 2246 hours, Detective Farmer conducted a recorded interview with Jose Ramirez at 4765 Fairfax Avenue and learned the following: Jose Ramirez was inside his residence at 4765 Fairfax Avenue with his brother Mario Ramirez when he heard the front door open and a unknown white male entered the house. Jose and Mario pushed the male out of the house, closed and locked the door, and called 9-1-1. The male subject attempted to get back inside and Jose Ramirez could see the subject had a seven inch long knife in his hand. The subject screamed, "I didn't do it!" and seemed scared. It then appeared to Jose Ramirez the subject fought with and hid from someone, but Jose Ramirez saw no one.

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The subject then ran eastbound to 4786 Fairfax Avenue and a few minutes later police officers arrived. Jose Ramirez directed the officers to where he last saw the subject. Jose thought the subject was "crazy, nuts", not drunk, but possibly on drugs. Jose Ramirez said he does not know the subject and has never seen him before.

INTERVIEW OF MARIO RAMIREZ-PANTALEON: On February 15th, at approximately 2245 hours, Detectives Farmer and Pazos conducted a recorded interview with Mario Ramirez at 4765 Fairfax Avenue and learned the following: Mario Ramierz was inside his residence at 4765 Fairfax Avenue with his brother Jose Ramirez when he heard someone open the front door and a unknown white male entered the house. Mario and Jose pushed the subject out of the house, closed and locked the door, and called 9-1-1. The subject stood outside, yelling and screaming; it appeared he fought with and hid from someone, but no one was there. The subject then ran eastbound to 4786 Fairfax Avenue. A few minutes later police officers arrived and Mario directed them to where he last saw the subject. Mario never saw a knife and thought the male was possibly on drugs. Mario said he does not know the subject and has never seen him before.

For additional details of Mario Ramirez' statement, see the transcript of the recorded interview.

INTERVIEW OF BRUCE ELLIS: On February 15th, at approximately 2250 hours, Detective Ivie conducted a recorded interview with Bruce Ellis, at 4786 Fairfax Avenue and learned the following: Bruce Ellis was inside his residence with his wife, Winifred Ellis, and their son, Richard Ellis, when he heard someone yelling at his front door. Richard opened the front door and a Hispanic male pushed his way into the house. The subject said someone was chasing him and was going to shoot him. The subject went to the master bedroom and hid. Bruce and Richard grabbed the subject and attempted to pull him outside, but when Bruce saw the subject possessed a "steak knife" with a dark handle and an approximately eight inch blade, they retreated. While his wife, Winifred, called 9-1-1, Bruce kept an eye on the subject. The subject seemed "scared to death" and never threaten him with the knife.

The subject moved from room to room, and attempted to jump out of a closed sliding glass door, but hit his head and fell back into the room. The subject then ran into the master bathroom and barricaded the door. When the officers arrived, they had Bruce, Richard, and Winifred exit the residence. A few minutes later the officers told them a shooting had occurred and the male was dead. Bruce does not know the subject, has never seen him before, and the subject had neither reason or permission to enter their residence.

Bruce Ellis signed a Consent to Search card, LVMPD 79 A, reflecting his consent for his residence to be processed for evidence relating only to the immediate incident. Winifred Ellis witnesses the consent.

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INTERVIEW OF WINIFRED ELLIS: On February 15th, at approximately 2245 hours, Detective Sanborn conducted a recorded interview with Winifred Ellis while at Cerrito Street and Fairfax Avenue learning the following: Winifred Ellis was in her computer room in their residence when she heard yelling coming from the living room. Winifred stepped into the hallway and saw an unknown subject running toward her, her husband and son following the subject. Winifred grabbed the subject by the arm as he passed her, and he said someone was after him with a gun. The subject looked terrified, broke free from her grip, and began running around the house. Winifred locked herself in her computer room and called 9-1-1. Winifred said she could hear the subject running around the house from room-to-room. While still on the phone with LMVPD dispatch, Winifred's husband told her the subject was locked in the bathroom. Winifred left the computer room for the living room, then outside where she waved two arriving officers into the house.

The officers gathered some quick information from Winifred, and proceeded into the residence towards the back bedroom. Winifred, Bruce and Richard waited outside their residence as several additional police officers arrived. Winifred was later told by the officers the subject had been shot, but she did not hear the officers giving commands, nor did she see the shooting.

Winifred said she did not know or recognize the subject who entered their residence, nor did she see him in possession of a knife. The subject did not threaten her, only appeared threatening, and seemed frightened. The subject was Hispanic, approximately five feet tall, short dark hair, and wearing a white dress shirt with black pants.

For additional details of Winifred Ellis' statement, see the transcript of the recorded interview.

INTERVIEW OF RICHARD ELLIS: On February 15th, at approximately 2305 hours, Detective Sanborn conducted a recorded interview with Richard Ellis at the intersection of Cerrito Street and Fairfax Avenue learning the following: Richard Ellis was in his bedroom with the sliding door open, when he heard someone outside yelling for help. Richard went to the front door of the house to investigate, and his father, Bruce Ellis, asked what was going on outside. Richard said he didn't know, but he was going to check it out. Richard opened the front door and a man pushed his way by Richard and ran into the house. The subject looked "scared to death" and ran in and out of several bedrooms trying to hide. The subject said someone was after him with a gun.

After the subject was inside the house for a couple minutes, Richard noticed he was armed with a black handled kitchen knife. Richard armed himself with a sword and told the subject he had to leave. The subject was not aggressive or threatening toward Richard or his family, but once Richard saw the knife, he felt the subject was acting crazy and could have turned on him in a "second". When the patrol officers arrived they told Richard to leave the house. Approximately five or ten minutes after the officers arrived, Richard heard at least one, possibly two, muffled gunshots. Richard said he was not able to hear any verbal commands the officers might have given the subject.

Richard said he did not recognize or know the subject and described him as a white male in his late thirties with short brown hair. Richard said the subject was wearing a yellow button-up shirt and jeans.

Detective Dosch conducted a canvas of the area and made the following contacts:

JOAN HARPER exited her residence at approximately 2040 hours and saw male subject walking westbound Fairfax Avenue, yelling for help. The subject ran across the street and she last saw him in front of 4765 Fairfax Avenue.

JOSE PEREZ said at approximately 2040 hours he was in his front yard when he saw male subject, with short hair and wearing a light colored shirt, yelling for help and for someone to call the police. Perez believed the subject was on drugs and saw him running to 4765 Fairfax Avenue. Because of the subject's actions, Perez became concerned for his safety and went inside his residence.

Detective Dosch did not locate any other residents who saw anything.

INTERVIEW OF SERGEANT WEBB:

As the first supervisor to arrive on scene, Sergeant Webb completed the Public Safety Statement (P.S.S.) with the involved officers. On February 15th, at approximately 2242 hours, Detective Mogg, along with Sergeant Darr, conducted a recorded interview with Sergeant Webb to document the P.S.S. Sergeant Webb said she read the questions from the department provided list of questions and recorded the officers' responses.

Sergeant Webb spoke with Officer Guzman first and learned he was in the bedroom of the residence when he fired one shot at and struck a subject armed with a knife at a distance of approximately five feet. The subject was alone and appeared deceased in the bedroom. Another officer fired his weapon as well, and all related evidence is contained in the bedroom where the shooting occurred. The only witnesses to the incident were the officers on scene.

Sergeant Webb spoke with Officer Henry and learned he was in the bedroom of the residence when he fired one shot at and struck a subject armed with a knife at a distance of approximately three feet. The subject was alone and appeared deceased in the bedroom. Another officer fired his weapon as well, and all related evidence is contained in the bedroom where the shooting occurred. The only witnesses to the incident were the officers on scene.

For additional details of Sergeant Webb's statement, see the transcript of the recorded interview.

CONTACT WITH OFFICER GUZMAN: Upon arrival of Police Protective Association legal counsel Charles Kelly, a "walk through" was conducted with Officer Guzman wherein he provided a cursory explanation of the scene and his actions to include the following: Upon arriving at 4786 Fairfax Avenue, he learned from residents a subject armed with a knife had locked himself in the master bedroom's bathroom. After a sweep of the residence for the armed subject, Officer Guzman entered the master bedroom and took a position in the southwest corner of the room, between the bed and wall, where he could best watch the closed bathroom door. Officer Guzman

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repeatedly called to the subject, identifying himself as a police officer and for the subject to exit the bathroom. After several minutes of challenging the subject and considering options of entering the bathroom to extract the subject, the officers on scene decided to handle the situation as a barricaded subject and maintain their positions pending the arrival of specialized units.

As the officers were waiting, the bathroom door suddenly opened and the subject, holding a knife in his raised hand (Officer Guzman demonstrated with his right hand) in an attack position, came running out of the bathroom towards and focused on Officer Guzman. Upon recognizing the subject's intent to attack him, Officer Guzman discharged his duty weapon one time at the subject's center mass when the subject had cleared the alcove to the bathroom and was moving into the bedroom. (*Note: Measurements in the scene, based on Officer Guzman's descriptions of his location and the subject's location, determined Officer Guzman was approximately 9'9" from the subject when he fired.*) The subject immediately began to stumble, went to his knee(s) towards another officer (Officer Henry) standing near the bedroom door. Seconds later Officer Henry fired his weapon and the suspect dropped to the floor.

The officers broadcast that shots had been fired and requested medical attention for the subject. Officer Guzman was sequestered and provided Sergeant Webb a P.S.S.

Officer Guzman was subsequently transported to the I.S.D. building where he was photographed to document his appearance and his weapon, a Glock 17 9mm, serial number _____, was counted down by CSIs Shrum and Madden, witnessed by Detective Mogg. The weapon was found to contain 16 rounds of Speer 9mm ammunition in the magazine and one round of Speer 9mm ammunition in the weapon's chamber. This was consistent with one round being fired. The weapon was impounded pending forensic examination. (*Note: A forensic examination of Officer Guzman's firearm was conducted by Forensic Scientist A. Moses, P# 8002, LVMPD Firearms Identification Unit, who determined the above firearm functioned within the factory parameters. For additional details, see the F.A. Moses' report under event number 110215-3792.*)

Officer Guzman ultimately elected not to submit to a recorded interview with F.I.T. detectives.

CONTACT WITH OFFICER HENRY: Officer Henry, also accompanied by Police Protective Association legal counsel Charles Kelly, completed a "walk through" of the scene and provided F.I.T. detectives a cursory explanation of the scene and his actions to include the following: Upon responding to the scene with other officers and learning a subject armed with a knife was currently barricaded in the master bedroom's bathroom, Officer Henry coordinated with the Ellis' in locating a key to unlock the bathroom door. As Officer Guzman's calls to the subject to come out of the bathroom went unanswered, they decided not to use the key, classify the situation as a barricaded subject, and await specialized units.

At about the time this decision was made, the subject opened the bathroom door and charged out toward Officer Guzman, holding a knife aloft in a manner consistent with attacking someone. Upon the subject entering the open area of the bedroom, Officer Guzman discharged his weapon one time at the subject, apparently striking him. The subject stumbled, went to his knees, and

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with the knife still raised in attack position, focused on Officer Henry. As the subject was approximately two feet away from Officer Henry, Officer Henry tried to back away but was already against the chest-of-drawers adjacent to the bedroom door. Officer Leavitt was standing in the doorway, further impeding Officer Henry's withdrawal. Officer Henry perceived the subject was going to stab him and, with his firearm held close to the right, mid-chest area, close to his body and cantered downward, Officer Henry fired one shot downward at the subject. The subject collapsed on the floor at Officer Henry's feet, dropping the knife. Officer Henry kicked the knife away from the subject's hand with his right foot and the knife came to rest in front of the chest-of-drawers.

Officer Henry was sequestered and provided Sergeant Webb a P.S.S. Officer Henry was subsequently transported to the I.S.D. building where he was photographed to document his appearance and his weapon, a Glock 34 9mm, serial number _____, with a TLR-1 tactical light, was counted down by CSIs Shrum and Madden, witnessed by Detective Mogg. The weapon was found to contain 16 rounds of Speer 9mm ammunition in the magazine and one Speer 9mm round of ammunition in the weapon's chamber. This was consistent with one round being fired. The weapon was impounded pending forensic examination. *(Note: A forensic examination of Officer Henry's firearm was conducted by Forensic Scientist A. Moses, P# 8002, LVMPD Firearms Identification Unit, who determined the above firearm functioned within the factory parameters. For additional details, see the F.A. Moses' report under event number 110215-3792.)*

Officer Henry elected not to submit to a recorded interview with F.I.T. detectives.

Officers Leavitt, Auten, Cripe, McKinney, and Sergeant Webb also responded to the I.S.D. building where they were photographed to document their appearance. Officers Leavitt and Auten's duty weapons were counted down; both weapons were loaded with Speer, department issued ammunition, and neither weapon appeared to have been fired. Officer Leavitt claimed he had deployed his Electronic Control Device (E.C.D.), but did not activate it. Officer Leavitt's E.C.D./Taser # X00-360739, was downloaded and it was determined it was not activated, nor fired during the incident, and there was no video of the incident recorded on the E.C.D.

Officers Leavitt, Auten, Cripe, McKinney, and Sergeant Web elected not to submit to recorded statements to F.I.T. detectives.

On February 16th, in furtherance of the investigation, Detective Mogg began researching Manvilla's Las Vegas contacts and learned he had worked for wedding chapels passing out flyers near the courthouse / marriage license bureau. Most recently he had been employed by the Stained Glass Chapel at 901 E. Ogden Avenue. Detectives Mogg and Hanna went to the Stained Glass Chapel and spoke Sherrie Klute and Stephen Smith, owners / operators of the chapel.

INTERVIEW OF SHERRIE KLUTE: On February 16th, at approximately 1205 hours, Detectives Mogg and Hanna conducted a recorded interview with Sherrie Klute at the Stained Glass Chapel, 901 E. Ogden Avenue, and learned the following: Klute has employed Tory "Rob" Manvilla, whose booking photograph she identified as the person she was referring to, off and on for several years.

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During that time she has known him to have problems with substance abuse (speed, crack cocaine, and alcohol), which was the reason she fired him most recently. Klute said when sober, Manvilla was a very nice and loving person, and never demonstrated any kind of mental problems. But when using illegal substances or alcohol, he became a "monster;" which she further described as being mean. Recently when she saw him, apparently under the influence, he was acting very paranoid, looking around a lot and claiming someone was after him.

When asked if she knew why he would be in the area of Mountain Vista Street and E. Hacienda Avenue, Klute told the detectives about Anthony Dickerson, another past employee who was also associated with Manvilla. Klute did not know Dickerson's address, but said she would attempt to locate it.

For additional details of Klute's statement, see the transcript of the recorded interview.

INTERVIEW OF STEPHEN SMITH: On February 16th Detectives Mogg and Hanna conducted a recorded interview with Stephen Smith at 901 E. Ogden Avenue and learned the following: Smith knew Manvilla from the wedding chapel as an employee who passed out flyers near the courthouse. Smith identified a booking photograph of Manvilla as the person of whom he was speaking. Smith said he has known Manvilla for five or six years, and during that time he knew Manvilla to abuse illegal substances. Normally the abuse would cause Manvilla to be "hyper... talking fast and a lot." As a rule, Smith found Manvilla to be a nice guy and no apparent mental problems.

For additional details of Smith's statement, see the transcript of the recorded interview.

A records check on Manvilla revealed a history of drug possession, batteries, property crimes and resisting arrests in Nevada and Wisconsin. Most recently Manvilla was a suspect in a domestic violence report filed on October 12th, 2010, event number 101210-1829, wherein a Susan Adams said she was rooming with Manvilla and they got into an argument. During the argument Manvilla punched Adams twice in the face.

INTERVIEW OF SUSAN ADAMS: On February 16th Detectives Mogg and Hanna conducted a recorded interview with Susan Adams at her current residence, Todd Motel on Las Vegas Boulevard South. Adams said she has known Manvilla, whose booking photograph she identified as the person to which she was referring, for approximately one year. She said they co-habitated for approximately one month in 2010 and that resulted in a domestic violence complaint against Manvilla. Adams said during their time together she saw Manvilla use alcohol, methamphetamine, and crack cocaine. When he used meth, Manvilla would be up all night, usually on his cellular telephone. When Manvilla used crack cocaine, he become paranoid; peeking under the front door, standing by the door and scratching on it, believing someone was after him, and pacing back and forth. Adams said when they first met, Manvilla was using drugs almost every day.

For additional details of Adams' statement, see the transcript of the recorded interview.

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Having not heard back from Klute regarding Dickerson's address, a records check was made and showed Anthony Dickerson resided at 4707 Fairfax Avenue; up the block from where Manvilla broke into the two homes. Detectives Mogg and Hanna went to 4707 Fairfax Avenue in an effort to contact Anthony Dickerson or his wife, Ambrosia Dickerson, but found neither home. Detectives did contact Jessie and Helen Jones.

INTERVIEW OF JESSIE JONES: On February 16th, at approximately 1443 hours, Detective Mogg conducted a recorded interview with Jessie Jones and learned the following: On February 15th, "Rob" Manvilla, whose booking photograph Jones identified, had been a guest of his step-son, Anthony Dickerson, at their residence. At approximately 1900 hours the night of February 15th, Manvilla seemed upset or frustrated, and left the residence walking down the street mumbling to himself. Jones said he did not know of any problems that came up, nor did he know if Manvilla took any drugs while at the residence. To the best of Jones' knowledge, Manvilla did not have any weapons when he left the residence. Shortly after Manvilla left the residence, he heard police cars and helicopters descending on the neighborhood. Jones did not go outside to investigate the cause of the commotion. He was not aware Manvilla had been shot by officers.

For additional details of Jones' statement, see the transcript of the recorded interview.

INTERVIEW OF HELEN JONES: On February 16th, at approximately 1445 hours, Detective Hanna conducted a recorded interview with Helen Jones outside her residence, 4707 Fairfax Avenue, and learned the following: Jones was aware that "Rob," was at their residence visiting her son, Anthony Dickerson, but she was busy fixing dinner and taking care of her six grandchildren. When Manvilla left, Jones was in her bedroom and didn't know the circumstances of his departure. In their few encounters, Jones said she never noticed any strange or unusual behavior from Manvilla, and never saw him ingest drugs.

Detective Hanna asked Jones if she had a set of steak knives in her kitchen and she produced a butcher block knife set that included five steak knives; one knife was missing. The knives had black handles with three studs holding them together. The blades on the knives were approximately five to six inches long and serrated. (*Note: T. Brownlee, P# 9975, responded to 4707 Fairfax Avenue and photographed the knives to compare to the one found at 4786 Fairfax Avenue. A subsequent comparison failed to match the knife recovered at the scene.*)

INTERVIEW OF AMBROSIA DICKERSON: On February 22nd Detectives Hanna and Mogg conducted a recorded interview with Ambrosia Dickerson at her place of employment, Walker Furniture, and learned the following: Ambrosia Dickerson, wife of Anthony Dickerson, has known Manvilla, whose booking photograph she identified, for approximately four or five years. Dickerson said when she arrived home on February 15th at approximately 1900 hours, Manvilla was there and her husband, Anthony, who told her Manvilla had no place to stay. While they were in the back room talking, Manvilla apparently left the residence. She only saw Manvilla long enough to say "Hi" as she passed through the residence on her arrival.

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A little after 1900 hours, they heard sirens and helicopters, but never suspected it involved Manvilla. No one ever asked where Manvilla went.

INTERVIEW OF ANTHONY DICKERSON: On February 22nd Detectives Hanna and Mogg conducted a recorded interview with Anthony Dickerson at the Clark County Detention Center and learned the following: Anthony Dickerson has known Manvilla for approximately six years and on February 15th Manvilla called Dickerson asking him if he could stay with him a couple of days. Dickerson picked Manvilla up near Sahara Avenue and Nellis Boulevard; Manvilla claiming he had been "partying" with a girl near Lake Mead Boulevard and Hollywood Boulevard. They returned to Dickerson's residence at approximately 1630 to 1700 hours; Manvilla did not have any belongings with him, just his cellular telephone.

Dickerson has known Manvilla to use crack cocaine and methamphetamine, but did not know him to use any that night. When Manvilla had used drugs in the past, Dickerson did not know him to act as bizarrely as he apparently did that night. Dickerson said he believed Manvilla was arguing on his cellular telephone with a woman friend in Texas, repeatedly saying, "That's fucked up. That's fucked up." (*Note: Recall Manvilla's cellular telephone was recovered, but it was password locked and the call records unavailable.*)

At approximately 2030 hours Manvilla left the Dickerson's residence and no one asked him where he was going or why he was leaving. Other than being a little irritated, Dickerson assumed from the call, Manvilla seemed completely normal. Dickerson heard the sirens and helicopter, but did not associate it with Manvilla. The following day he learned Manvilla had been trying to get into houses and was shot by the police. Dickerson said Manvilla had never spoken about anyone being after him, or his being in trouble with anyone, and his running down the street yelling someone was after him made no sense.

SUMMARY

Absent any witnesses to the contrary, the investigation has established Tory Robin "Rob" Manvilla had a history of substance abuse, and the abuse was known to cause episodes of paranoia. While no one witnessed Manvilla ingesting illegal substances on February 15th, the autopsy toxicology report reflected Manvilla had amphetamine and methamphetamine in his system. Given the toxicology findings and witnesses statements, Manvilla's actions were consistent with someone under the influence of illegal substances or suffering a mental episode.

An examination of the evidence at the scene proved to be consistent with the officer's description of Manvilla's actions and their responses. Specifically, where Officer Guzman's claimed he was

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standing in the bedroom was consistent with where the ejected shell casing from his firearm was located (*Scene Diagram, Item #1*), and the penetrating injury to Manvilla's chest is consistent with Manvilla charging towards Officer Guzman. Officer Henry's description of firing at the aggressing, while kneeling, Manvilla is consistent with the perforating wound to Manvilla's neck and chest, the bullet being found at the foot of the bed (*Scene Diagram, Item #3*), and Officer Henry's shell casing located near the body (*Scene Diagram, Item #2*).

Manvilla's forced entry into the Ellis' residence, and subsequent attempt to injure the responding officers, compelled Officers Guzman and Henry to respond with deadly force in defense of their own lives as set forth in NRS 200.200.
